

Casuarina equisetifolia L.

Family: Casuarinaceae

Common name: Horsetail she-oak

Vernacular name: കാറ്റാടിമരം

Nativity: India to W. Pacific

Habit: Tree

Habitat: Human Altered Environments including yards, roadsides

IUCN Status: Least Concerned

Keynotes: Casuarina equisetifolia is an evergreen tree and has a conifer-like appearance. The foliage of this perennial plant consists of slender, much branched green to grey-green twigs, bearing minute scale-leaves in whorls of 6 to 8. The flowers are produced in small catkin-like inflorescences. It is monoecious, with male and female flowers produced on the same tree

Uses: Uses include house posts, rafters, electric poles, tool handles, oars, wagon wheels and mine props. Tannin or dyestuff: The bark contains 6-18% tannin and has been used extensively in Madagascar for tanning purposes.
