

Roystonea regia (Kunth) O.F.Cook

Family: Arecaceae

Common name: Cuban royal palm

Vernacular name: ബോട്ടിൽ പാം

Nativity: Bahamas, Belize, Cayman, Cuba

Habit: Tree

Habitat: Moist abundant in Cuba, hillsides and valley

IUCN Status: Least Concerned

Keynotes: Roystonea regia is a large palm which reaches a height of 20–30 metres tall, and a stem diameter of about 47 cms. The trunk is stout, very smooth and grey-white in colour with a characteristic bulge below a distinctive green crownshaft. Trees have about 15 leaves which can be up to 4 m long. The flowers are white with pinkish anthers.

Uses: Roystonea regia has been planted throughout the tropics and subtropics as an ornamental. The seed is used as a source of oil and for livestock feed. Leaves are used for thatching and the wood for construction. The roots are used as a diuretic, and for that reason they are added to tifey, a Haitian drink, by Cubans of Haitian origin. They are also used as a treatment for diabetes.
