

Terminalia arjuna (Roxb.) Wight & Arn.

Family: Combretaceae

Common name: Arjuna tree

Vernacular name: നീർമരുത്

Nativity: Assam, Bangladesh, India

Habit: Tree

Habitat: Sub-Tropical and Tropical moist regions of the country.

IUCN Status: Not Evaluated

Keynotes: T. arjuna grows to about 20–25 metres tall; usually has a buttressed trunk, and forms a wide canopy at the crown, from which branches drop downwards. It has oblong, conical leaves which are green on the top and brown below; smooth, grey bark; it has pale yellow flowers which appear between March and June.

Uses: The arjuna is one of the species whose leaves are fed on by the Antheraea paphia moth which produces the tassar silk, a wild silk of commercial importance.
